COMPRÉHENSION - EXPRESSION

Vous traiterez les questions **dans l'ordre**, en indiquant clairement leur **numéro** sur votre copie. Lorsque la réponse doit être développée, le nombre de mots ou d'éléments de réponse sera indiqué dans la question.

En l'absence d'indications, vous répondrez brièvement (moins de 20 mots) à la question posée.

Questions 1, 2, 3 and 4: focus on lines 1 to 27.

- 1. Line 1: "A postcard came airmail from London."
- a) Say who this postcard is addressed to and who is actually looking at it. It is addressed to Vic and Deepa. They're looking at it with their parents. 4 pts
 - b) Deduce the name of the narrator. The narrator is called Vic. 2 pts
- 2. Describe the characters' dominant reaction when looking at the postcard.

 They scrutinize the postcard / They are all fascinated / impressed / amazed by London. / They think it's wonderful. / They find it very exotic. 4 pts
- 3. Line 19: "He tacked the postcard on the upright behind his table, where it stayed for more than a year..."
 - a) Who does "he" refer to? The narrator's father / "Papa" 2 pts
- b) Using elements from the text, find three reasons why this character decides to tack and keep the postcard. (50 / 60 words)
- He <u>admires</u> London, which he considers as "the biggest city in the world" (I. 9) or even the "centre of the universe" (I. 16-17).
- He really wants to go there, it is his "dearest wish" (I. 16).
- He is proud to have a postcard from "European friends" (I. 20).
- What is more, going there would give him a different status in his hometown. He would become "one of the London-returned" (I. 18). 12 pts

Exiger 3 idées sur 5, dont la dernière.

Bonus pour l'élève qui mentionne l'idée de religion ou de sacré.

Le candidat pourra intégrer des citations à sa réponse.

4. a) What aspects of Bill and Annie's trip to London do the narrator's parents discuss? (3 elements)

For the father, it's <u>expensive</u> and <u>long</u>. For the mother, the main problem is that Bill and Annie are <u>on their own / it is risky</u>. 6 pts

b) Lines 26-27: "Who'd hurt a British child, Papa snapped in reply, they'd have every policeman in the world looking for them. That privilege comes from ruling the world." Explain what the father means by that. (40 / 50 words)

He does not think it is dangerous even if the children are by themselves. Nobody would ever dare to hurt or kidnap a British child because at the time Britons were considered as the "masters of the world" (bonus pour "...by people from the colonies"). 12 pts

Questions 5 and 6: focus on lines 28 to 37.

- 5. a) How does Bill and Annie's absence affect Deepa and the narrator's mood and activities? The narrator and Deepa miss them / They're bored. They spend their time imagining what their friends are doing in London. / Their games are less exciting and less adventurous.

 6 pts
- b) What do Deepa and the narrator's activities show about their vision of London? They think it's a wonderful place.
- OU They see London as a land of plenty. It makes one think of a fairy tale.
- OU They have a stereotyped vision of London (since they can only imagine the city according to what they read and saw on the postcard). 4 pts
- 6. a) What decision does the mother make after the postcard has arrived? She decides to organize a trip for the whole family (to Nairobi and Mombasa). 4 pts
- b) Commenting on the use of "too" (line 35) and "all of us" (line 36), explain what motivates her decision. (40 / 50 words)

She thinks there's no reason why her children shouldn't have a break too (competition, rivalry...).

She intends to prove she's a better, more responsible mother. That's why she wants them to leave as a family, instead of letting Vic and Deepa manage on their own. 10 pts

Question 7: focus on the passage from line 38 to the end.

- 7) a) Say where the narrator is in this passage. He is on the train (going to Mombasa). 2 pts
- b) "...taking in deep breaths of that cool, clean air and, simply, with wide hungry eyes absorbing my world." (lines 43-44)

What happens to the narrator at that moment and how does it affect him for the rest of his life? (40 / 50 words)

The narrator is excited. He realizes that there is a world beyond his neighbourhood and that Kenya is the place where he belongs. Though he admires England, Kenya is really his home country. That experience provides him with memories he can call back at any time in his life. 12 pts

Subject 1

"... it was his dearest wish to visit that centre of the universe once in his lifetime." (lines 16-17) Is there a place in the world that you would particularly like to visit? Explain why.

Subject 2

"Leaving is more important than arriving". Discuss and illustrate, drawing from your experience or your readings.

7. riding double-buses and taxis,

les tours / balades en taxi ou dans les bus à (deux) étages, 3 pts

8. visiting all those castles and palaces and bridges we had read about,
